Paradoxically, Bob's career is as high tech as it gets. He's an engineer at Fermilab—as in the Fermi National Accelerator Laboratory, where top physicists build and operate particle accelerators, smash atoms and delve into dark matter. Bob, who holds BS and MS degrees in mechanical engineering from the prestigious University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign, holds this title at work: Primary Machine Engineer for the Main Injector at Fermilab. He began his career with jobs at internal combustion engine companies. But he jumped at the big league change — to work

shares with his wife Maura and toddler daughter Reese. Maura develops curricula for special education high schoolers, and is an enthused Birch Rocker herself. Bob grew up in Geneva and likes being close to his mom's home, especially since his dad Mike's death in 2019. Soon after their loss, Bob and his mom and sister set up the Michael J. Donahue Family Foundation to continue the philanthropic work of the pater familias. Inevitably in Bob's life, things circle back to Birch Rock Camp. For the summer of 2022, his family's foundation sponsored two fine young men from the Midwest to enroll at

Birch Rock.

COVID restrictions have kept Bob (and just about every other visitor) away from camp for a few summers now, but Bob brought Maura and Reese for a few days in September for his first in-person Board of Trustees meeting on the Hillside. A good time was had by all, especially with adorable Reese entertaining the grown-ups. As the newest member of the Facilities Committee, Bob was eager to take a good look around and offer his preservationist opinions for campus planning.



HENRY PLATE 1925-2022

Birch Rock notes with sorrow the death on August 30th of our fine neighbor Henry Plate at the age of 96. Rich Deering explained how grateful Birch Rock has long been to the Plates:

"Henry and Joy have been faithful friends to Birch Rock since the first time I made a neighborly visit in the mid 1990s! Henry always extended his helping hand to me and BRC. We shared stories about McWain Hill, neighborhood relationships, vendor contacts, and most of all, building community connections. In 1999, Henry graciously gave up his coveted

50-plus year board seat on the McWain Pond Association so that I could be a member of the organization. He felt it was important that "the boys of Birch Rock Camp" were officially represented. As the camp grew in size, so did our need for field activity space. Since the early 2000s, Henry and Joy have allowed our boys to use their contiguous hay fields for our archery and soccer programs. What an incredible supplement to our campus! Most of all, what a terrific enhancement for the overall Birch Rock Camp experience! Henry would gleefully shout from his porch, "Make more noise, we cannot hear you enjoying yourselves! You need to be louder and continue to have fun!" I'd banter back to him: "Watch out, Henry—Joy may pack you a trunk and ship you over the Hillside for the summer with us!" Henry's parents bought the property in 1940 when he was a camper at Waganaki next door. Young Henry took to farming like a loon takes to Lake McWain. He taught himself to farm,

> planting fields of corn to sell to a local cannery. As his family reports, Henry planted gardens for the rest of his life but preferred growing vegetables to eating them.

> Henry's love of agriculture led him to the University of Maine, Orono, where he earned a BS in Animal Husbandry. Next came two years in the Army during World War II, then a return

to Orono for a MS in Agronomy (the science of soil management and crop development). He got a job at Eastern States Farmers Exchange (which would become Agway) retiring as Chief Agronomist after 39 years. Henry and Joy moved to Waterford full-time in 2005, and he enjoyed swimming, driving his tractors and fixing their spectacular barn.

Henry and Joy's grandson Austin Shelnutt was a BRC camper, and their granddaughter Kelsey Plate joined our kitchen staff in 2012 and 2013. Birch Rock Camp and our extended community extend condolences to the whole Plate Family for their loss of a stupendous man from the Greatest Generation.
