THE STAYING POWER OF SETH BREWSTER '67

Ceth Brewster is drawn to challenge Olike a loon to Lake McWain. A competitive swimmer in his youth at Deerfield Academy and Dartmouth College, his favorite event was the hardcore Individual Medley (demanding mastery of the butterfly, backstroke, breaststroke and freestyle). For 35 years he's been a highly respected commercial litigator and trial lawyer in Portland, Maine. For nearly a quarter of a century, this grandson of Birch Rock Founders Chief and Onie Brewster has chaired Camp's Board of Trustees. In 2026, Birch Rock's 100th season, Seth will step down as Chair and pass the baton to his friend and longtime Birch Rock treasurer Mike Herzig ('70s, S '80s, T '90s, P '00s).

Endurance is a theme that explains much about Seth, in his athletic, professional and philanthropic endeavors. And in his personal life. "Speed dating" is a thing, but how about "endurance dating?" Seth, then a longtime bachelor, met a blind date at the trailhead of Mt. Washington in September of 2021. His date was Stefanie Bachhuber, who'd traveled up from Washington, D.C. for this — repeated for emphasis - blind date. Seth and Stefanie, set up by a mutual friend, had spoken only once before on the phone. Seth was a few minutes late that morning and near the trailhead Stefanie kept asking men in hats pulled low against the chill, "Are you Seth?" Stefanie was a bit nervous

because they hadn't checked in before that 7:30 a.m. rendezvous on September 11th. Seth had explained to her on their one phone call that he'd be "off the grid" before their hike (he'd been on an annual

backpacking trip out West with college buddies up until September 10th).

At 7:38 Seth and Stefanie found each other and headed off to summit Mt. Washington. And summit they did. The trek took about 8 hours, perhaps an unusual amount of time for a first date. And Stefanie hadn't realized quite how formidable the climb would be. But they hiked and talked and she appreciated Seth's patience and helpfulness. During their descent, Stefanie wondered why Seth wasn't asking her out to dinner. It turned out Seth had shopped the night before and presented a lovely spread of wine, cheese, fruit and other bites for Stefanie in the parking lot. Salty Snacks

Seth had met his match, an adventurer like himself, and he was ready for the next big commitment of his life. They were married in June of 2023.

Seth and Stefanie now divide their time between homes in Maine and Washington, D.C., where Stefanie worked in finance until her recent retirement and where her mother still lives. It's come full circle for Seth, who worked for three years in D.C. on the legislative staff of U.S. Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, right after graduating from Boston University Law School in 1987.

Following his late 1980s stint on Capitol Hill, Seth and his young family moved back to his home state of Maine. In his illustrious career as a litigator, he practiced at a few big-name Portland law firms and is now a partner at Jensen Baird. Seth and his first wife raised their two daughters, Tory and Hannah, and their son Ben ('00s, T'20s) in Cape Elizabeth. Ben describes his dad as "tenacious and competitive" but also says, "He doesn't take himself too seriously and has a real joyous side."

Seth has two young grandsons, Hannah's 2-year-old David and Ben's baby son Kaiden. Kai, for short, was born in March 2025 and for the first several weeks of his life, Seth drove up to Brunswick from Portland to help

new parents Ben and Becky one night each week, cooking dinner and providing helping hands. Now he and Stefanie enjoy visiting Kai and his parents a couple times a month.

Seth's sister-in-law Becca Brewster (T '90s, P '00s), widow of Birch Rock legend Toby Brewster, described Seth this way: "He always gives 120%. He brings a positive, inquisitive energy to everything. Seth shows up. He is so dependable and loyal." The death of his brother Toby in 2023, who Seth eulogized as his "wingman," was a hard blow. It's made Seth and Stefanie draw even closer to Becca and her four sons, all Birch Rockers. Becca laughingly explained Seth's gung-ho approach to something as basic as cooking their annual Thanksgiving turkey. Simply roasting the bird in the oven is not up to snuff for Seth — he's perfected a wet-brined, spatchcocked turkey on the outdoor grill.


Seth's other passions include open water swimming from June until October in the Pine Point Estuary in Scarborough, downhill skiing, and yearly wilderness backpacking trips (last month Seth and a group of friends hiked the White Cloud Mountains in Idaho). He competed in the modern pentathlon in college and in 2000 finished an Ironman triathlon in Florida (featuring a 2.4 mile swim, 112 mile bike ride and a 26.2 mile run).

Seth is a Birch Rock gentleman through and through, with his love of outdoor adventure and *Help the Other Fellow* ethos. Reflecting on Seth's 24-year stewardship of Birch Rock through much evolution and preservation efforts, Mike Herzig explained, "His style has always been conducive to collaboration and letting people express their creativity and love for Camp. In that sense, we could have had no better leader than Seth." Mike and Seth go way back, to the summer of 1979 when Seth was Mike's swimming instructor. After decades of shared Board of Trustee meetings, Lake McWain swims and personal difficulties, Mike said of Seth: "He's always been there for me like a brother."

Bob Cleaves ('60s, S '70s, P '00s, T '00s) is another Birch Rocker who shares an enduring friendship with Seth, starting in 1967 when the two Beavers were cabin mates in Cabin 1, now know as Bee's Hive. Bob remembers from the time Seth was 8 years old that he was "a fun, solid kid, comfortable in his own shoes. And I swear that kid hasn't changed."

Rich Deering (Alumni & Community Director '73) had this to say: "Growing up and working with Seth has been like flying with Superman. He has a superhuman strength of character to always do the right thing to help others. He is fearless when faced with adversity. Life challenges never get the best of him. Seth's power is balanced by his incredible self-deprecating humor."

100 year-old Birch Rock Camp is secure on the Hillside, with a 100 year lease signed by the Brewster family and two fourth-generation family members now serving on the Board of Trustees. Seth will remain on the Board and his devotion to Camp endures.

In reminiscing about their days on staff in the late 70s/early 80s after camp ended for the summer, Seth shared a favorite memory of his brothers Toby and Ben (who died in 1985): "In the evenings, in the waning days of August, the three of us would sit on the top of the hill, watch the night sky, and talk about Camp and plans for the fall." Seth summed up by saying, "Birch Rock is the place where I feel most grounded and where Lake McWain washes away the clutter of the outside world. Every time I drive on the campus, I feel like I am coming home."

Alexander McLaughlin

Alex is a former camper and counselor and the eldest of three brothers who attended Birch Rock. His parents Julie and Mark are former BRC trustees. Alex has an MBA from the UCLA Anderson School of Management and a BA in Economics from Johns Hopkins University. He is recently married, lives in La Jolla, California and is a Director at MacKay Shields (a boutique investment firm, part of New York Life Investments Company). Alex's family owns the former Camp Waganaki just up McWain Hill Road from Birch Rock.

Rebecca Melvoin

Becca's parents have a house across Lake McWain so she grew up listening to Birch Rockers enjoying life on the lakeshore. As her sons grew she and her family thought BRC would be a wonderful place for them — Hunter Sherburne at age 12 just finished his fourth summer and Kieran at 10 finished his second at Camp.

Becca is Dean of Residential Life and Senior Class Dean and a history and social science teacher at Deerfield Academy in Deerfield, Massachusetts. Becca started her life at Deerfield as a faculty kid. Twenty years after leaving the Valley and graduating from Bowdoin College where she majored in Sociology and Africana Studies, Becca returned to Deerfield in 2009, having taught at the Lakeside School in Seattle and Beaver Country Day School

in Chestnut Hill, Massachusetts. Prior to her return to Deerfield, she earned MAs from Brown University and Boston College in American Civilization and History, respectively. Later she earned her Ed.D. in Education Leadership from the University of Southern California. As the Dean of Residential Life, Becca works with students and faculty to make the boarding experience more rewarding. This year Becca is also teaching one course, African and Latin American History, and coaching softball.

Andrew Chase

Andrew, better known at Camp as Cheeser, first made his way from home in Yarmouth, Maine to Birch Rock in 1997. He was a camper for four summers and is proud to have gone on the inaugural Maine Wilderness Adventure trip 25 years ago! Andrew continued as a CIT and served on staff for three years.

Andrew earned his BS at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University in Florida and flew in both commercial aviation and in the New York State Air National Guard. He's currently Chief Pilot at Northrop Grumman Corporation and lives in the Washington, D.C. With this edition of *The Birch Bark*, BRC kicks off its 100th anniversary year! Since 1926, campers have flocked to the Hillside to join our exuberant, non-competitive community. I think it's fair to say that boys' need for Birch Rock has never been greater, a century along.

What Birch Rock offers — so key to the healthy development of boys and young men — is a keen sense of belonging. Birch Rockers of all ages interact each day at Camp, get to know each other well, and bond over hallowed traditions and rituals. Bunkmates learn how to cooperate in their small, tidy cabins. Boys thrive on face-to-face contact with other campers and counselors all day — playing, talking, working things out. These are behaviors that help boys develop socially and feel good about themselves. Birch Rock excels at sparking "social electricity," a term coined by *The Anxious Generation* author Jonathan Haidt to describe the feeling of being seen and understood by others.

Birch Rock knows that the way to supercharge this sense

of belonging is to keep life no-tech. Boys thrive in nature, minus the phones, online games and social media accounts. The thesis of *The Anxious Generation* is concerning: children born after 1995 have been under-protected in the virtual world, while at the same time overprotected and restricted in the real world. Birch Rock has an antidote to these problems. At Camp we build a culture of belonging and say no to digital devices. We help build confidence and character by saying YES to physical freedom and autonomy for boys. Birch Rockers leave camp each season a little healthier in body, mind and spirit.

This powerful sense of belonging can last a lifetime for Birch Rock campers. So what could be better than seeing old friends at a big reunion this coming summer?! Charlie Lansdale on his second try and Ethan Neff on his very first attempt passed as official JMGs this summer. Well done, gentlemen! Ethan said everything about JMG was highly difficult — practicing various testing parts at least twice each day at Birch Rock, studying

the written materials, and getting the pacing right during the five days at testing camp (with three days of actual tests). But Ethan loved the week-long canoe trip the JMGs took with Jeff and Max Naipier-Kane as preparation — "They both inspire me!" said Ethan. And Ethan really enjoyed peaceful walks around the Birch Rock campus with Jeff and the other JMGs to identify trees and other flora. Ethan was enthralled at the end-of-summer Chip Ceremony when Jeff bestowed upon him a cherished knife that will always bring back memories of his JMG summer.

The Junior Maine Guide program is a rigorous Maine wilderness camping skills program sponsored by Maine Summer Camps and the Maine State Department of Inland Fisheries & Wildlife. JMG was created in 1937 to promote the use of wild Maine for recreation and to train young people in environmental conservation. JMG promotes wilderness leadership and character development, requires intensive preparation, and puts myriad skills to meticulous testing.

JMG certification requires proficiency in a broad range of abilities: canoeing, fire-building in wet and dry conditions, emergency shelter building, first aid, cooking over campfires, old-fashioned map and compass skills (for wilderness areas beyond GPS range), flora and fauna identification, ax use and more.
